This phrase originated with Dr. Chris Peterson, one of the founders of positive psychology and Mike Erwin's mentor and advisor in graduate school. "Other People Matter" was Chris' thesis resulting from his decades of research.

As Chris wrote in 2008, he would often begin lectures by stating, "I can sum up positive psychology in just three words – Other People Matter. Period. Anything that builds relationships between and among people is going to make you happy." Chris passed away suddenly in October 2012 and we are proud to carry on his legacy through the research on character and relationships that he led for over a decade.

SAFETY REMINDER/PARKING LOT REMINDER:

Parents that choose to come into the building for drop off or pick up, <u>please</u> park in a parking space. **DO NOT park in the driveway.**

- The driveway is meant to have a continuous flow for the drop off and pick up of students.
- If you are waiting to drop off or pick up your student(s), <u>please wait in line until the vehicle in front of you moves up. DO NOT PULL OUT TO GO AROUND THE VEHICLE IN FRONT OF YOU.</u>
- Your child should enter and exit the vehicle on the right side or passenger side of your car along the sidewalk. Hold your child's hand while walking on the sidewalk and in the parking lot.
- Continue to use the cross-walks to walk your student(s) from the parking lot to the sidewalk and school building.
- If you park in the parking lot, please use one of the designated parking spots. **Do NOT move the parking cones. Do NOT pull up and park on the grass.**

Help to keep our students safe by following the parking lot procedures. Please continue to <u>drive</u> slow, and PLEASE be patient – don't pull out of line to cut around other cars. Thank you.

Positive behavioral interventions and support (PBIS) is a way for schools to encourage good behavior and teach expectations. With PBIS, kids learn expectations and school rules, just as they learn other subjects like math or science. Students learn how to report dangerous or destructive situations. Here are just a few highlights:

- > Every child can learn proper behavior.
- > Studies show PBIS can help improve student discipline, behavior and even grades.
- > PBIS is for all students in school!
- > PBIS promotes showing **kindness** to others by being gentle, helpful and friendly at school and home.
- ➤ All staff members including bus drivers, custodial staff, paras, office staff and teachers look for ways to reward positive behavior by using our STAR BUCKS reward money! Students can turn these STAR BUCKS in for prizes.

IMPORTANT MESSAGE:

Parents, with the cold and flu season upon us, we understand the need for medicine! PLEASE – if you feel the need to send your student to school with cough drops, have them bring them to the office for safe keeping. This keeps students from sharing with their friends and a potential allergic reaction should they fall into the wrong hands. However mild they may be, they are still medicine and need to be kept by an adult. Thank you for your cooperation in keeping our students safe and healthy!!!

Dress for the Weather!

PLEASE dress your child for outdoor recess daily! We will be going outside each day, weather permitting. The temperature outdoors must be 15 degrees F including wind chill to safely take students out. With the cold weather coming, hats, gloves and warm coats will be needed. Make sure your child's name is on his or her coat, snow pants, etc. This will help alleviate confusion of who the clothing belongs to.



Do You Know Someone Who Is Homeless?

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act defines a "homeless individual" as someone who lacks a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence and also has a nighttime residence that is a shelter or a hotel, an institution that provides temporary residence, or a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as regular sleeping accommodations for human beings. In general, children or youth who live in hotels, housing shelters, on the street, in cars or in abandoned buildings are considered to be homeless. If you are not sure if you or a friend fit this description, please check with the data paraprofessional in the office of any Anchor Bay School. Please teach your child how to respond and give them talking points. Of course, notify your child's teacher, or school social worker, or the principal. They are able to assist if a problem arises.

What qualifies as bullying behavior?

This is the system that we use at Naldrett. It is important to note that students should report an issue to any staff member (teacher, lunch para, bus driver or principal). Sometimes if a situation is dangerous or destructive, they should go right to Step #5 - Get Adult Help.

Medications / Medical Information

School personnel, as restricted by the State of Michigan, are not allowed to administer ANY medication unless it is under a doctor's order. When a student is in need of medication during the school day, the following procedure MUST be followed:

- 1. Medication must be accompanied by a doctor's written order and written authorization of the parent or guardian (forms available in the office).
- 2. The medication must be in the original container. The student's name, the physician's name, current date, the name and strength of the medication, and the specific directions as to the administration of the medication must be listed. The office staff cannot split pills that are in the container.
- 3. All medication must be delivered directly to the school office by a parent or guardian.
- 4. Liquid medication must be in a pre-measured form for each dosage that will be administered.
- 5. Any unused medication unclaimed by the parent will be destroyed by school personnel when a prescription is no longer to be administered or at the end of the school year.
- 6. A log for each prescribed medication shall be maintained which will note the personnel giving the medication, the date, and the time of day. This log will be maintained along with the physician's written instructions and the parent's written permission release.

Under NO circumstances are children to bring ANY medication to school or on the bus. This includes aspirin, cough syrup, cough drops and all over-the-counter medications. If you have any further questions or concerns, please contact the school office.

Remember, it ALL drains to our lakes and rivers.

Storm drains and roadside ditches lead to our lakes and rivers. So, any oil, pet waste, leaves or dirty water from washing your car enters a storm drain gets into our lakes and rivers without being treated. With almost five million people living in Southeast Michigan, we all need to be aware of what goes into our storm drains. How can you help? Simple.

- 1. **Sweep it**. Do you have extra fertilizer, grass clipping or dirt on your driveway or sidewalk? Sweep it back onto your lawn. Hosing your driveway sends these pollutants into storm drains that lead directly to our lakes and rivers.
- 2. **Keep it clean.** Whether in the street or in your yard, remember to keep leaves, grass clippings, trash and fertilizers away from storm drains.
- 3. **Only rain in the drain**. Never dump motor oil, chemicals, pet waste, dirty or soapy water, or anything else down the storm drain. All of these materials pollute our lakes and rivers.
- 4. **Label it**. Volunteer to label the storm drains in your neighborhood to inform residents that storm drains flow directly to our lakes and rivers. Call your local community for more information on storm drain stenciling programs.
